bōbiam | b3 experience: Micro Hotel, art gallery, work space, and special events

An Artistic and Modern Place to Work, Stay, and Play

What starts with a "b", has a long "o" sound, and rhymes with "Liam"? The answer: bōbiam. A father's playful rhyme has become the mascot for Sparta's new b3 experience, which encompasses the comforting visitor draws of micro hotel and art gallery, along with a work and special events space. b3 is an artistic, playful, and serious family legacy. Once the Beaver Creek Creamery, which delivered milk in the early 1900s, located at 123 North Court Street, in Sparta, the b3 invites visitors to stay a while, relax, and be inspired.

Owner/Operators, April, Liam, Wyatt, and Stella Farrell and Gage Andersen have created a livable, functional artistic expression in Sparta, Wisconsin - from an abandoned building. Gage explained that they did 95% of the remodel themselves, sourcing out the other five percent to local plumbers and electricians. Liam shared that, since their soft opening 6 weeks ago, they have had 75% occupancy, with very little marketing. The majority of visitors have been bicyclists, visiting from many different areas of the state and country.

The entire Farrell family is full of ideas and enjoys inspiring, supporting, and collaborating with others within the city. According to them, they are here for the long haul. This exciting new artistic space has their own fun and quirky b3 terminology, all rich with meaning and

In stark contrast to the hundred-year-old classic Carnegie library, which is in mid-transformation next door, the old Beaver Creek Creamery has been undergoing a very modern and somewhat mysterious transformation of its own. For the past couple of years, museum and library patrons have seen people working around the previously abandoned building, since the most recent owner passed away. The workers, who are also the new building owners, were busy bees, yet always made time to share a friendly smile. Some people, such as the original creamery owner, stopped in to check it out and learn more. But, for the majority of Sparta, the big question was, "What were they building in there?"

On Saturday, August 17th, 2024, bōbiam opened its doors to the public, for their big open house event, to finally share their special handcrafted and modern space. For 12 hours, the Farrell family and Gage welcomed people in, giving them full tours of the indoor and outdoor spaces, featuring Bill's art and design offerings. Along the way, they answered any and all questions; fed the hungry; and shared their "vibe" or "wibe" with all who entered. We will explain soon!

Inside, guests are delighted by natural light, pops of color, exposed brick, a central fireplace, and art throughout. From wall hangings to the furniture and interior design elements, such as doors, tables, mirrors, sinks, and desks, it is apparent that when it comes to art and design, anything Bill Farrell dreams of is not only possible but actually manifests in real time, all becoming additions of the b3 experience.

With a background in engineering and design, and a passion for art, Bill Farrell enjoys designing signature modern art pieces, for commercial and residential spaces. His rental properties are the perfect places to both utilize and showcase his art and design, which include made-from-scratch designs, as well as upcycled items, such as sliding 'barn' doors made from shipping containers. Most of his own designs are hand rendered into functional interior design elements locally, in Minnesota. "I like to use concrete, glass, and powder coated aluminum," Farrell explained.

He also sources pieces that harmonize with his "wibe" from Europe. Explanation approaching! As a result, in each of the four rooms with sleeping accommodations, guests will discover handmade modern art furniture, designed by the owner himself. Primary red, yellow, and blue are key colors he utilizes, as well as bright green and orange, in the sinks, doors, desks, tables, seating, and beds. Modern and immersive showers and baths, along with quiet, automatic high-tech toilets, all add to the atmosphere of artful comfort and modern luxury. Each room also features an "Art TV," which when on standby mode, can feature a beautiful work of art, upon the large black screen.

b3 is along Beaver Creek, with views of the new library addition, Beaver Creek Bridge, and the Sparta Farmers Market. They have worked with the City of Sparta from the beginning, building a strong relationship with City Administrator, Todd Fahning, on following city ordinances, codes, and zoning. "Todd and the City of Sparta have been just amazing to work with," Farrell beamed. He explained that the codes and detailed instruction on such work can

become quite a headache. Another part of Sparta that they love is the growing downtown. The Farrell family has been frequenting local downtown businesses, to stay fueled during the remodel, and they have enjoyed building relationships there, too. Along with the Sparta Chamber, Bill has some clever ideas on boosting business mutually, for any downtown businesses that want to collaborate. For

example, Cork & Barrel and the Beer Shop may leave drink chips for guests, and there are Matsumoto Ramen House and Kazoku Bistro Japanese cuisine menus on hand.

While business is important to their family and the local economy, as landowners and business owners, the Farrells know that sustainability, the land, nature, and habitat are the backbone of everything. Bill Farrell explained how they have a focus on sustainability. "The black exterior will offset heating costs and resources, by employing passive solar heat technology, and the black stucco will attract the winter sun and significantly warm the building."

b3 experience is also interested in partnering with groups like The Monroe County Land Conservation Office and the Monroe County Invasive Species Working Group, to restore the habitat on the hillside, leading down to Beaver Creek. The beauty and stability brought back by these efforts will be rewarded with a priceless view and habitat.

For overnight guests, as well as people who come in to work in the daytime, there are shared spaces, such as the lounge area, bar, conference room, and outdoor spaces. Future additions will include a full kitchen, pickleball court, e-bike rentals, a special event tent, and a basement speak-

easy bar for guests and events. For now, b3 is open and thriving, with overnight accommodations available; work-space shared opportunities; and special event space to rent out. The shared workspace will be available to patrons via a key card, which is operable per a monthly fee. The current rate is \$100 per month and allows workers access to the shared spaces, from 8:30 a.m. to 6 p.m., Monday through Thursday. This can be an ideal solution for flexible workers, gig workers, creatives, artists, and entrepreneurs, who want another option besides home or office.

The overnight accommodations and special event spaces are available for booking by contacting the owners, at b3experience.com Any guest, art patron, or property owner can purchase Bill Farrell's original modern art pieces or numbered metal prints and functional modern art furniture designs, by scanning the QR codes featured near each piece, or by visiting the b3 experience website.

When Liam was seven, he drew a figure, which is now the b3 experience mascot. It is featured in the b3 brand, as well as prominently in the lounge area of the new micro
